KINGFISHER COUNTY EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT HOSTS DISASTER EXERCISE

Kingfisher County, OK – Emergency management teams, first responders, and municipal leaders from across Kingfisher County came together on Wednesday, April 9, for a Tabletop Exercise designed to simulate a large-scale tornado disaster.

The exercise began with a simulated severe weather advisory from the National Weather Service, forecasting potential tornado activity. As the scenario unfolded, a tornado warning was issued by midday. A confirmed tornado touched down near Cashion and later moved through Kingfisher, causing significant damage to infrastructure and public buildings, including City Hall.

A second tornado was reported on the ground, impacting both residential and commercial areas. The exercise concluded with a structured evaluation session during which participants discussed what worked well, identified resource and communication gaps, and proposed areas for improvement. Insights from this Tabletop Exercise will be used to develop a formal After-Action Plan with specific improvement actions. The five-hour event, hosted at Cimarron Electric, was attended by approximately 40 people. Participants included representatives from Pioneer, Kingfisher County Administration, Police, Fire, Public Works, and Emergency Management, as well as leadership from the Cities of Kingfisher, Cashion, and Loyal, with support from the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management. UNMASKING AUTISM

with Morgan Gonzales

Morgan Gonzales was a guest on the All About Kingfisher show for an upcoming episode and took the time to speak on Autism, Speech Therapy, and Building a Business.

Morgan grew up on a farm in Vici, Oklahoma, "middle of nowhere," she jokes, where GPS doesn't even pronounce the name right. She was raised with cattle, pigs, and horses, and she still lives the country life with her family just north of Enid. In fact, her bio says she's raising "free-range chickens and kids." If you've seen her kids running barefoot outside with the dogs and chickens, you'd get it. Interestingly, Morgan didn't set out to be an

entrepreneur; in fact, she was warned against it in grad school. But after five years working in the field, she realized she could build something on her own. "If you don't like the business side of things," she says, "it's not for you." But Morgan jumped in and learned everything from accounts receivable to running a full therapy clinic.

April is Autism Awareness Month, Morgan's unexpected specialty: working with autistic children. In grad school, she fell in love with this work, and while her career took her through acute care and other experiences, she's now come full circle. What is autism?

Autism, she explains, is a neurodevelopmental disorder, something you're born with, not something you catch or develop later. Often, signs start to show around age 2 or 3, when social and language demands increase. That's when red flags like delayed language, limited social interaction, or unusual play behaviors start to appear.

One topic that stood out was how autism presents differently in girls. Morgan revealed something deeply personal: she herself was diagnosed just last year with Level 1 Autism and ADHD. Girls often mask their symptoms by imitating others or characters from shows, which can delay diagnosis. She shared a college story where she unknowingly mimicked a UK accent after working with a British lab partner, something that now makes a lot more sense in hindsight.

Asperger's, once considered separate, is now part of the autism spectrum. What used to be described as "high functioning" or socially awkward is simply recognized today as a different point on the spectrum.

Why early intervention matters:

Some parents fear labeling their child, Morgan says. But getting a diagnosis can open doors to valuable resources: developmental services, financial assistance, and support for daily needs like diapers or nutrition. More importantly, it helps caregivers better understand their child, not as "bad" or difficult, but as overwhelmed and needing different support. "We want to avoid that gap from growing," she says. "What looks like a small delay at two can be a huge delay by kindergarten if we don't step in early."

Morgan's story is a powerful reminder that labels don't limit us—they inform us. Whether it's a parent noticing early signs in their child or an adult discovering a piece of their identity later in life, understanding autism means opening doors, not closing them. And with people like Morgan leading the way, those doors are opening wider every day. Kingfisher High School is proud to recognize Senior Brayden Osterholt as a 2024 QuestBridge National College Match Finalist an honor awarded to just 7,288 students out of over 25,500 applicants nationwide. Quest-Bridge is a prestigious nonprofit organization that connects high-achieving, low-income students with top-tier colleges and universities. Brayden's academic excellence, leadership, and determination helped him stand out on a national level, and his achievement marks a historic milestone: he is the first student from Kingfisher to ever be accepted into Yale University. Rather than participating in the traditional Match program, Brayden opted to apply through QuestBridge's Regular Decision process, which offers more flexibility in selecting a college. Out of over 50,000 applicants to Yale each year, the acceptance rate is just 4.6%. For QuestBridge applicants through Regular Decision, that number drops even lower-to just 3.17%. Despite the odds, Brayden was one of only 66 students nationwide who matched with Yale through the QuestBridge program, and one of just six students from Oklahoma admitted to Yale this year. He has accepted a full scholarship that will cover 100% of his demonstrated financial need. Brayden plans to major in Environmental Engineering and will attend a special campus event at Yale April 21st-23rd, where he and his family will have the opportunity to explore the university, attend seminars, and celebrate this remarkable opportunity. His journey is a powerful example of perseverance, academic dedication, and the incredible possibilities available to students who dream big. Way to go, Brayden!



REMEMBRANCE

Anyone who is from Oklahoma will forever remember April 19, 1995. I also think about my beautiful mom. April was her birthday month, and her favorite religious holiday, Easter, will always be in my heart. I remember exactly where I was on April 19, 1995, at 9:02 when the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City had a truck bomb explode, killing 168 people, 19 of whom were children. I can recall exactly where I walked down the sidewalk at Pioneer delivering mail. But being a mom, what is even more prevalent was my children and where they were.

My son was in 4th grade in Tonya Cameron's class. The bombing, in its devastation, planted a seed to serve in my 4th-grader's heart. In 2003, after graduation, he left on June 10th on a 20-year journey of service to his country. I'm terrible at remembering dates, but when watching a piece of my heart walk away to start his new chapter, there was a part of me that wanted to stomp and scream, while another part couldn't be more proud!

Something that stays with me to this day is that I wrote him every day while at boot camp. When I addressed the letters, I used his middle name, which is what we all called him. Unknowingly, he never received any of my letters because his full name wasn't correct as the Navy saw it. Me and the Navy saw a lot of things from a different perspective! That was an epic moment that failed and broke my heart. He honored the pledge he made that day in Mrs. Cameron's 4th-grade class, retiring after 20 years of service and achieving the rank of Navy Chief.

You probably don't want to complain to me about having your adult children living close by. Yes, he traveled the world, and I was able to visit places I never expected to. There were different stations every three years and several deployments, life-changing events—some devastating, some beautiful. My mom's heart learned the power of prayer! Some of those deployments I was told about, but what is haunting are the stories still bottled up inside him.

The term Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) refers to a disorder in which a person has difficulty recovering after experiencing or witnessing a terrifying event something we will probably witness if we are on this earth long enough. I never thought my 4th grader would be able to relate to the first

After plenty of photos, attendees made their way into the theater, where the cast members participated in a Q&A session with the audience.

As the lights dimmed, the documentary opened with a historic clip of President George H. W. Bush signing the Americans with Disabilities Act in 1990. The story then moved forward to show that, 35 years later, not much has changed.







In the film, Debbie Espinosa, President and CEO of the Center of Family Love and Executive Producer of People Like Us, challenged the use of the term "disabled." "Can't we remove the 'dis'? How pathetic that we define a population by what they supposedly can't do," she said.

Daisy stole the show. A resident and

cast member, Daisy shared some of the most profound life experiences and insights, blending humor with heartbreak in a way that left a lasting impact.

The producers did an excellent job of addressing a complex topic in an accessible, heartfelt way — telling the story through those who live it, in their own voices.

Vision for the New Campus

The Center of Family Love is expanding its services with the launch of a second campus — a bold step toward building a new platform for its residents. This future includes growing the Center's capacity to serve more individuals with disabilities and learning differences.

As part of this initiative, the Center has launched a capital campaign to raise \$40 million for the construction of the Oklahoma Institute for Cognitive Development. This 70,000-square-foot training and education facility will allow the Center to provide programming services to an additional 500 individuals with developmental disabilities.
