Where Play Meets Purpose

Exciting things are happening at Kingfisher First Methodist Church as the congregation continues to invest in community-centered projects, with a focus on creating welcoming and meaningful recreational spaces for local families. Two major initiatives have taken shape: a full-size, fenced-in basketball court and a new playground designed specifically for older children. The vision for these projects came out of conversations about how to better serve kids who had outgrown the smaller play areas, and the church adjusted its plans along the way to accommodate an upcoming housing addition nearby. Jim Butcher, a member of the church and a retired architect, graciously volunteered his time and expertise to draw up the plans that brought these ideas to life.

More than just places to play, these additions reflect the church's deeper mission. "We want this to be invitational, relational, and transformational," a member shared—words that have shaped the church's vision this year. "How do we invite people into a relationship with Christ and help them build relationships with one another?" In a time

where loneliness is so prevalent, these spaces are being built to offer more than fun-they're meant to be reminders of God's love and presence.

The basketball court, now completed, is already making a difference. As the only outdoor full-size basketball court in town, it's designed as a multiuse space featuring basketball goals, four-square lines, and pickleball markings, with plans to add a portable pickleball net soon. But the heart behind it all goes far beyond recreation. The church is intentional even with the signage—moving beyond standard "play at your own risk" notices to messages like, "You are fearfully and wonderfully made, so treat yourself and others with respect."

While many who use the court or playground may never walk through the church doors or meet someone from the congregation, the goal is for them to still encounter a message of love, belonging, and dignity. "We may not be there when someone plays," said Rev. Jennifer Long, "but we still want them to know they are beloved by God." And the hope is that as people gather in these spaces, relationships will be formed, hearts may be touched, and perhaps, transformation begins—so that love can continue to spread outward into the community and beyond. The Methodist church is still raising money if anybody is interested in contributing. If you would like to donate, make out a check to Kingfisher First United Methodist Church and put Playground Project in the memo section. Donations can be dropped off at the church anytime between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Mondays through Thursdays.





FROM CHEMISTRY LABS TO LAND DEALS

with Dillon Smith



Dillon Smith, a fifth-generation Kingfisher native, helps Oklahomans connect with the land through his work at National Land Realty.

When you speak with Dillon Smith, it's immediately clear he's a man of depth, direction, and deeply planted roots. A fifth-generation native of Kingfisher, Oklahoma, Dillon's life path has been anything but predictable. From a rigorous academic start in chemical biosciences to long nights in a diagnostic lab during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, and eventually to a career helping others connect with the land that means so much to him. Dillon grew up in Kingfisher, where his family has farmed for generations, tracing their lineage back to shortly after the Land Run. After graduating from high school, he pursued a degree in chemical biosciences at the University of Oklahoma, an ambitious choice that he says was driven by a desire to challenge himself and prepare for medical school. "I just asked my advisor what the hardest degree was," Dillon laughs. "It sounded impressive."

His plans for medical school took a detour, however, when he found himself working graveyard shifts at the

Diagnostic Laboratory of Oklahoma during the early days of the COVID pandemic. "I was working in the lab doing bloodwork, diagnostics, pretty much any test being done in the state," he recalls. As the virus took hold, the lab pivoted heavily toward COVID testing, and Dillon found himself immersed in exhausting, high-stakes work that left little room for the outdoor pursuits he loved.

That realization sparked a turning point. "I couldn't go hunting on weekends with my family. I was literally in a lab," he says. Looking for a creative outlet, Dillon started an outdoors podcast focused on hunting and fishing. What began as conversations with friends evolved into deeper interviews with outfitters and others in the outdoor industry. It wasn't just a hobby, it was a signal pointing him back to his true passion.

One of Dillon's podcast listeners ended up offering him a job as Director of Marketing for a land brokerage, which opened the door to his current role with National Land Realty. Now in Kingfisher, he works with buyers and sellers across the state, helping people make informed, strategic decisions about their land investments.

A standout innovation in Dillon's work is the use of Land Tour 360, a patented technology developed by National Land Realty that allows potential buyers to view dronecaptured panoramas of properties online. "A lot of listings only show photos from the ground, which don't tell the whole story," he explains. With Land Tour 360, users can virtually explore a property from above, getting a clear sense of terrain, water features, and layout without ever leaving their home. It's a game-changer for rural properties and has made the buying process far more efficient for clients.

Dillon also guides clients through leasing strategies, auctions, and 1031 tax-deferred exchanges, helping them unlock the full value of their land. "For families who inherit land but don't farm, that can be a huge benefit," he explains. With a restored office in Crescent, Dillon is close to home, and that's exactly where he wants to be. "Oklahoma land means something different to people here," he says. "It's not just acreage. It's legacy." **To view the podcast visit allaboutkingfisher.com**



A Journey of Faith, Healing, and Hope: The Self Family's Story

In August 2024, Desirae and Chris Self moved from El Reno to our small town of Kingfisher. With their oldest child about to start elementary school, they wanted to ensure their children could attend a school where education and personal growth would be a top priority. Kingfisher, known for its strong community and educational resources, seemed like the perfect place to raise their family.

Desirae is the proud owner of her own photography business, Desirae Self Photography, while Chris works at the assessor's office in Canadian County. The couple tied the knot in 2018 and welcomed their first child, Noah, in 2020 and their second, Eli, in 2025. After struggling to conceive for three years, they had just sold all their baby gear and quietly let go of their hopes for another child when, two weeks later, they found out they were expecting again—just one month after Desirae was told she had PCOS. "We know God can do impossible things," Desirae said, reflecting on what felt like a miraculous timing for the pregnancy. However, that wasn't the only significant news Desirae received last summer. After a few years of health struggles, she was finally diagnosed with Lyme disease.

Lyme disease is an infection caused by a type of bacteria called Borrelia burgdorferi, which is transmitted to humans through the bite of infected black-legged ticks, often

referred to as deer ticks. Desirae doesn't remember having a tick bite since high school, so the disease most likely laid dormant for over a decade.

Early symptoms of Lyme disease usually appear 3 to 30 days after the bite and can include a red, expanding rash (often resembling a bull's eye), fever, chills, fatigue, muscle and joint aches, headaches, and swollen lymph nodes. If not treated early, it can lead to more serious complications such as arthritis, heart problems, and neurological issues. Doctors typically treat Lyme disease with antibiotics, and most people recover fully if treated promptly.

There are four main stages of Lyme disease: early localized (days to weeks after the tick bite), early disseminated (weeks to months after infection), late disseminated (months to years after infection), and Post-Treatment Lyme Disease Syndrome (PTLDS), where symptoms persist even after the infection is gone and the patient has completed antibiotic treatment. Desirae has Late Disseminated Lyme Disease and is unfortunately past trying to fight this illness with antibiotics alone.

To make matters more trying, Lyme disease is not covered by insurance and can be expensive to treat. Desirae had her first appointment this past Monday, April 28th, to begin her SOT treatment. SOT (Supportive Oligonucleotide Therapy) is an alternative or experimental treatment where specially designed synthetic DNA or RNA molecules (called oligonucleotides) are created to target and block the genetic material of the Lyme bacteria (Borrelia burgdorferi). The idea is to "silence" or shut down critical functions of the bacteria, making it unable to survive or replicate—like flipping the "off" switch on the infection at a genetic level.

Here's how it works:

1. A blood sample is taken from the patient to identify the specific bacterial strains.

2. A custom SOT molecule is created based on that information.

3. The patient receives the SOT through an IV infusion.

4. The therapy circulates throughout the body, seeking out and disabling the bacteria over time.



Although experimental, SOT has a roughly 70% success rate, with each treatment costing \$2,500.

Depending on the number of targeted pathogens determines how many infusions Desirae will need. Regardless the infusions often are spaced out 8 to 12 weeks, depending on the body's response and symptom progress. Some individuals report noticeable symptom relief after just one treatment, while others may need more depending on chronicity, CO-

infections, or severity. Here is to hoping for the best-case scenario!

To help with costs, the family has set up a GoFundMe account with a goal of \$15K to start. So far they have already obtained 20% of their goal. If you feel led to give, please consider donating. Another way people can support the family financially is by booking a session with Desirae. Despite the challenges posed by her illness, she still plans to continue to do what she loves, meeting new people and capturing beautiful moments through her photography business. Chris is always looking for new job opportunities, knowing that if Desirae's condition worsens, it will become very difficult for him to provide for a family of four on one income alone. Be thinking of him and reach out if you hear of anything.

"I know many people experience chronic pain and illness, and it can be extremely lonely," Desirae said. "One purpose God has given me in this is to let others know they're not alone. They are seen, loved, and cared for. Joy and healing are still possible. I want people to know that the joy I have comes from Jesus and that He is my strength. I talk

about my illness because if I help just one person, then my pain has a purpose."

Their family is ready to face whatever challenges come their way with love, perseverance, and faith that, no matter the trials, they are exactly where they are meant to be. Please keep the Self family in your thoughts and prayers as they continue their journey of healing, hope, and new beginnings. by Maitland Pickle

THE TEACHER'S PATH



Steven Wilson, Kingfisher native and educator, serves as a teacher, coach, and mentor.

Steven Wilson's story begins right here in Kingfisher, Oklahoma, where he was born and raised. A 2005 graduate of Kingfisher High School, Steven's educational journey took him to several colleges before earning his Bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education from Oklahoma State University in 2013. He most recently completed his Master's in Secondary Administration from East Central University in 2024.

He married Lauren Bell of Burns Flat on January 4th of this year, an accountant at East River Roustabout in Kingfisher. Together, they've built a life rooted in community, commitment, and passion for their work.

Steven's teaching career began in the fall of 2014, where he taught Pre-K in Cashion. But just a semester later, he was called back home to Kingfisher to step in for Mrs. Cheap's 4th-grade class after her cancer diagnosis. It was an unexpected but meaningful opportunity that set the tone for a career defined by stepping up when it matters most.

After that year, Steven moved to Geary, where he took on the role of head football coach for five years. Under his leadership, Geary made history—literally. He became the winningest coach in Geary Football history and earned Oklahoma Football Coaches Association's Coach of the Year honors in 2017. But Steven didn't stop at the sidelines; he was also named Geary's Teacher of the Year in 2018—a rare feat for a PE teacher, but not surprising to anyone who knows his character, work ethic, and ability to connect with students.

From Geary, he returned to Cashion, where he taught 7th and 8th grade science from 2020 to 2022. During his time there, he served as an assistant football coach and head wrestling coach, helping lead the football team to back-to-back State Championship titles—further cementing his reputation as a dedicated mentor, coach, and leader both in and out of the classroom.

Steven says, "I knew I wanted to be a teacher in 6th grade. When a childhood mentor, Sam Wood, told me that I needed to give back to other children someday.

His favorite grade or grades to teach are 7th and 8th grade. He believes students at that age are easily influenced, eager to learn, and at a pivotal stage in life where a strong role model can make a lasting impact. His favorite subject to teach? That's an easy one, science.

Steven's favorite part about the job is getting to see kids grow and develop daily—and just as importantly, putting a smile on their face. For him, it's about building relationships and making a positive impact that lasts far beyond the school year.

In 2022, Steven came full circle. Returning once more to Kingfisher. Now, he teaches 7th and 8th grade History and Health at the Kingfisher Junior High. He also coaches junior high football, baseball, and wrestling, as well as high school wrestling, where he serves as the boy's head wrestling coach. His leadership has not gone unnoticed as he was voted Region 1 Coach of the Year for wrestling for the 2023–2024 season and just recently given the role of Committee Leader for the Oklahoma Wrestling Coaches Association.

Steven loves Kingfisher and wants to see it be the best it can be because it gave him so much as a child. His roots run deep in this community, and now he's working every day to pour back into the town that helped raise him.

When he's not teaching or coaching, Steven enjoys spending time outdoors—especially fishing. He is a sports enthusiast, loves watching games, and even umpires in his spare time. He is also a huge Oklahoma State fan, especially devoted to their football and wrestling programs, and a loyal supporter of the Pittsburgh Steelers. More than anything, Steven is a man of faith. He loves Jesus, and lives by Joshua 1:9—"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go." He and Lauren are active members of the Cashion First Baptist Church, where they attend every Sunday.

Whether it's in the classroom, on the field, or in the community, Steven Wilson brings integrity, dedication, and heart to everything he does. And for Kingfisher, he's more than just a coach or a teacher—he's a hometown hero giving back every single day.






